JOHN (drawing back) This wasn't a good idea.
JUNE It's too late for that - we're paid up in full.
JOHN It's not in the best interest of the kids.
JUNE They're having a whale of a time!
The noise of children playing. Listen to your boy, John! Can't you make out his voice?

Exit John.

JOHNNY

(from offstage)

Mummy!

Harry got me a helicopter! It flies and everything!

JUNE

(calling)

We're not doing presents now!

JOHNNY

You've got to come down and see! Mum, it's wicked!

JUNE

(collecting herself)

Well, that's very generous!

You'll have to thank his parents, Johnny.

You'll have to say thank you.
